As an ICT for development organization, Savana Signatures seeks to use ICT as a tool to develop the minds of youth, women and vulnerable group of people in Ghana to enhance their livelihoods and for nation building.

Savana Signatures focuses on the use of ICTs for development with special focus on Education, Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR), Youth Development and Gender and Social Inclusion.

Technology for Maternal & Child Health (T4MCH) project;

With funding support from Global Affairs Canada, T4MCH is aimed to

contribute to; the reduction of maternal and infant deaths, increased ANC attendance rate, skilled delivery, and access to maternal health information

My World My Life (MWML) project contributed to; Improved knowledge of teachers and students on comprehensive sexuality education and SRHR, boosted confidence of teachers and students to effectively deliver and discuss CSE lessons, exposed officials of Ghana education Service and Ghana health Service to Comprehensive Sexuality Education and Youth Friendly services

Get Up, Speak Out (GUSO) GUSO is a new SRHR project being implemented by six consortium members in Ghana SRHR Alliance. These organizations include Planned Parenthood Association of Ghana (PPAG), Savana Signatures, Hope for Future Generations (HFFG), Curious Minds, NORSAAC, and Presbyterian Health Services-North (PHS-N).

Savana Signatures is leveraging the strategies of its three most successful SRHR projects; My World and My Life (MWML), The World Starts With Me (WSWM) and Sexual Health Education (SHE+) Projects in the implementation of GUSO.

GUSO sought to empower and improve about 12,000 young people's reproductive health lifestyle in Ghana. It is aimed to contribute expertise in SRHR to meet SRHR needs of young people in Ghana.

The World Starts with Me; Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) conditions are integral part of the wellbeing of people. In Ghana, SRHR education has been given less attention at the national, regional and community levels. This apparent silence about SRHR education contributes to high incidence of unsafe sexual practices among young people in Ghana.

These unsafe sexual practices do not only affect the physical wellbeing of young people, but it affects their psychological development also increases Sexual transmitted infections (STIs) such as HIV and AIDS, gonorrhea, syphilis, candidiasis among young people. The WSWM continued to provide SRHR education to teachers and students in 12 schools in 5 districts across Northern and Volta regions of Ghana.

In the year under review, 8,500 in and out-of-school students, parents and teachers were reached with SRHR information directly and indirectly.

Mobile for Inclusive Governance; In 2016, Savana Signatures with financial support from Making All Voices Count continued to implement Mobile for Social Inclusive Governance (MSIG) project.

MSIG reached 19,000 targeted women, youth, marginalized and People Living with Disabilities (PLWDs) groups in the project area with the

message of local governance processes, accountability, responsibilities and systems. This has encouraged the targeted beneficiaries to participate in local governance processes thereby increasing demands for government services and accountability in the project area.

To deepens decision making processes at the local level, MSIG established Citizens Interactive Platform (CIP), an electronic communication channel that enabled PWDs, women and youth groups to communicate with local government authorities and the vice versa.

The Technology for Maternal and Child Health Project (T4MCH) was developed to contribute to the reduction of maternal and infant mortality in 33 health facilities in nine Districts of Northern, Upper West, Volta regions of Ghana.

The project uses strategies such as mobile Messaging (SMS) and Interactive Voice Response (IVR), Electronic Charting and audio-visuals technologies to mitigate both direct and indirect causes of maternal and infant deaths. It also addresses the poor general health of women, high-risk reproductive characteristics, and barriers to preventive health care for both mothers and children.

T4MCH is a collaboration between Savana Signatures, Salasan Consulting Inc., and Mustimuhw Solutions, with funding support from Global Affairs Canada.

T4MCH Objective

To contribute to the reduction of Maternal and Child death in 33 health facilities in Northern, Upper West and Volta regions of Ghana.

Technology for Maternal & Child Health (T4MCH)

Target beneficiaries

T4MCH seeks to reach 30,000 women and husbands over a period of 4 years through the following;



Mobile Messaging, Knowledge Sharing Sessions (KSS), Electronic Charting, and 'the Mother's Story' (a participatory research tool). To improve maternal and child health data, T4MCH is funding research on maternal and child health in the project areas.

what has been done

1. Conducted a baseline survey in the targeted project health facilities/communities
2. Reached 726 health staff during baseline survey
3. Reached 306 regional and district stakeholders (Ghana Health Service, and Metropolitan, Municipal, District Assemblies (MMDCes) through sensitization meetings
4. Reached 3,663 community men, women, and young adults through 33 community sensitization/outreach programmes
5. Sensitized 99 Traditional Birth Attendance (TBAs) in 33 communities
6. Constituted T4MCH Steering Committee (chiefs, academia, Regional Directors of GHS, MMDAs key staff).
7. Constituted research committee

8. Opened call for research fund

What were the challenges faced?

- Poor road network
- Poor network coverage
- Language barrier
- Attrition caused shortage of staff at the facilities level

What were the lessons learned?

- Language barrier informed inclusion of more languages in the mobile messaging system.
- Cultural beliefs hinder the delivery of maternal and child health care
- Most women do not have their own mobile phones
- TBAs' committed to refer mothers to the health facility for delivery
- Most communities are not connected to electricity and will require generators to carry out community level Knowledge Sharing Sessions
- District directors of health were excited about the project as they hoped it will contribute to efforts to reduce maternal and infant mortality, increase ANC & PNC attendance and skilled deliveries

In Ghana, SRHR education has been given less attention at the national, regional and community levels. This apparent silence about SRHR education contributes to high incidence of unsafe sexual practices among young people in Ghana.



These unsafe sexual practices do not only affect the physical wellbeing of young people, it affects their psychological development and increases Sexual Transmitted Infections (STIs) such as HIV and

AIDS, gonorrhoea, syphilis, candidiasis among others are high among young people because they are not equipped with SRHR information to make informed decisions/choices.

As part of efforts to reduce new STIs infections and spread, Savana Signatures adopted sexuality education programme called The World Starts With Me (WSWM).



**What is the
WSWM?**

The WSWM is a computer and paper-based comprehensive sexuality education curriculum developed for young people between the ages of 10 and 14 years. The project is being financially supported by RFSU.

It is being implemented in two regions; Volta and Northern regions of Ghana. The programme is being implemented in 5 districts in the Northern region and 3 districts in the Volta regions as shown in the table

In the year under review, 6,200 in-and out-school persons, parents and teachers were reached with SRHR information directly and indirectly.

This number was reached through, lesson facilitation sensitization and review workshops, radio discussions, school/community exhibitions and adaptation trainings.

Achievement

- Changed of attitude by some parents, students, teachers and community members towards sexuality education
- Re-enforced responsible parenting
- Reduced teenage pregnancies among students in the beneficiaries' schools
- Created awareness on the need for sexuality education
- Increased access to SRHR information and services for young people and community members in the project area
- Contributed to creating an enabling environment for parent-child communication on sexuality

Challenges

- Frequent teachers transfer hindered continuous facilitation of the WSWM lessons in the project schools.

Young People In Charge Project (YPIC)

The Young People in Charge (YPIC) project is an integration of social, financial and sexuality education aimed to enhance a healthy and productive life of young people.



It was designed to benefit young people between the ages of 10 to 24 years.

YPIC content is derived from two sexuality education projects, the World Starts With Me (WSWM) and My World, My Life (MWML) both

of which are being implemented by Savana Signatures and aimed to contribute to improved reproductive health and rights of young people, through the reduction of new HIV and STI infections and teenage pregnancies.

The objectives of YPIC is to empower young people to make healthy and informed decisions through comprehensive sexuality and social and financial education. This is to ensure that young people access to SRH and financial services are improved. It is also to create enabling environment for young people to make informed choices about their SRHR needs.



Young People In Charge Project (YPIC)

The project is strengthening and integrating key development issues such as health, education and economic empowerment that are required to achieve positive health outcomes for young Ghanaians. The project is being implemented by three partners; Savana Signatures and ACDEP with technical support from New Dawn for Social Development.

What have been done

- Conducted a refresher training for facilitators (teachers) on the integrated Comprehensive Sexuality Education and Child Social and Financial Education Curriculum
- Periodic visits to schools and health centers to provide support to teachers and health workers.

- Trained health workers on Youth Friendly Services
- Trained peer educators to support school and community outreach programme
- Built capacity of clinic health committee members to act as advocates for the youth friendly services
- Advocated with the Regional and District Health Directorates for community based distribution of contraceptives and community-based HIV/STI-testing as included in new policy.
- Invited banks to schools to conduct educational sessions on goal setting, good savings and spending habits.
- Organized teachers and health workers workshop to improve linkages between schools and health facilities
- Organized awareness raising workshops for community leaders to raise awareness on Comprehensive Sexuality Education and Youth Friendly Service utilization.
- Supported teachers, facilitators and peer educators to provide evidence-based Comprehensive Sexuality Education and Child Social and Financial Education in schools.

What were the challenges faced?

- Attrition of students in project schools
- Teachers and health workers transfer
- Poor support from some Head teachers in some project schools

- Break down of computers in some project schools using the WSWM CSE curriculum
- Disruption of weekly lessons by extracurricular activities

What were the lessons learned?

- The need to provide financial and sexuality education to parents at PTA meetings to inform them the need for financial and sexuality education for young people.
- Train school authorities and GES on integrated CSE and CSFE needed.
- Train more CSE facilitators in schools and Youth Friendly Service providers needed.



Get Up Speak Out Project (GUSO)

The Ghana Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) Alliance {Ghana SRHR Alliance), was formed by eight independent civil society organizations (CSOs) working in Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) programmes.

The coalition was formed as part of efforts to strengthen the implementation of SRHR programmes in Ghana through Access, Service and Knowledge (ASK) programme introduced in the country in 2013.

Get Up Speak Out Project (GUSO)

GUSO basically aimed to contribute expertise to meet SRHR needs of young people in Ghana. The project has five outcome areas:

1.	A strong and functional alliance that promotes young people's SRHR through SRHR programming and policy influencing on SRHR at all levels
2.	2 Empowered young people increasingly voice their rights
3.	Increased utilization of comprehensive SRHR information and education by all young people.

5.	Improved social-cultural, political and legal environment for gender-sensitive, youth-friendly SRHR.

information to young people to enable them access SRHR services for a healthy reproductive life. The project will create an enabling environment for young people to freely access and discuss SRHR issues affecting them.

Savana Signatures through GUSO undertook sensitization and education on SRHR issue through stakeholders meeting, schools, Ghana Education, Ghana Health Service engagement meetings in 2016. The rest of the activities will be carried out in 2017.



The above outcomes are intended to provide relevant and factual SRHR

Integration of ICT in Education Project (IIEP)

With funding support from EDUCO, Savana Signatures continued to implement the Integration of ICT in Education Project (IIEP) in 2016.



Besides this, 10 teachers were trained as mentors using Young Reporters Training Module, 50 teachers benefited from ICT pedagogy training, 7 circuit Supervisors were trained on the use of the School Management Information System and 20 teachers (ICT teachers and head teachers) were trained also on the use of the School Information Management System.



The focus of the project in the year under review was on child empowerment and child rights advocacy. 100 students and pupils were trained as young reporters. They undertook some advocacy activities on child rights.

All these activities were to encourage teachers and GES staff to help empower children to undertake effective advocacy on child rights issues.

The child rights advocacy component of the IIEP

Integration of ICT in Education Project (IIEP)

started in 2015 and continued in 2016 as part of efforts to contribute to the reduction of child rights abuse in the Savelugu/Nanton Municipality.

A child rights survey conducted in Savelugu/Nanton Municipality cited high incidence of child rights abuse as a challenge to children's education in the municipality. This informed Savana Signatures to design the child rights advocacy component of the IIEP.

The 10 project schools in the Savelugu-Nanton Municipality in 2016 selected and empowered 10 students each as Young Reporters who serve as advocates on child rights within that community.

Child Rights Activities conducted

- Knowledge sharing on Child Rights for selected students
- Knowledge sharing for teacher mentors on child rights
- Community engagement session with community stakeholders such as Assembly Members and PTA/SMC members. This engagement session was geared towards getting stakeholders to support the Young Reporters in terms of the advocacy work on child rights.
- Capacity building for Teacher Mentors on how to use the Young Reporters Training Module to train students on Child Rights Reporting
- Young Reporters gathered child rights stories.
- Sharing of child rights stories via radio discussions and online platforms, such as the Voices of Youth platform

ICT Pedagogy

- Training of ICT teachers on ICT pedagogy
- Routine Maintenance of ICT equipment in project schools
- Monitoring of the use of ICT pedagogy in the classroom by teachers
- Training of teachers and head teachers on the use of the School Management Information System (SMIS)
- Training of Circuit Supervisors on the use of the SMIS



Integration of ICT in Education Project (IIEP)

Direct Beneficiaries



- 100 students and pupils were trained and participated in child rights advocacy activities as Young Reporters
- 10 teacher mentors benefited from training on Young Reporters Training Module
- 50 teachers from 10 project schools benefited from training on ICT pedagogy
- 7 circuit Supervisors benefited from training on the use of the School Management Information System
- 20 teachers (ICT teachers and head teachers)

benefited from training on the use of the School Information Management System

Indirect Beneficiaries/Targets

- Almost all communities in the Savelugu-Nanton municipality and beyond were reached through radio discussions by Young Reporters. The young Reporters used the radio as a platform to share the child rights stories.
- 40 community members, serving in PTA/SMC groups and as well as Assembly Members were sensitised on the importance of child rights

through community engagement sessions.

- Students/Pupils in all project schools, especially those in the same class with the Young Reporters benefited indirectly from the child rights trainings and activities.

Achievement

- Teacher mentors in project schools reported an increased confidence in Young Reporters, evident in the fact that, Young Reporters have begun mentioning and discussing issues affecting their rights.
- PTA/SMC groups and Assembly Members have increased awareness on child rights, and provided support to Young Reporters in their advocacy work at the community level
- There is an increased number of teachers in project schools with an interest in, and who actually use ICT tools to facilitate lessons in the classroom

What were the challenges faced?

- Some ICT teachers and teacher mentors who were leading in the ICT pedagogy and the child rights activities respectively were transferred from the

project schools. This created a gap in for the implementation of project activities

- Unresponsive school leadership in some schools resulted in low interest on the part of teachers to use ICT tools in facilitating teaching and learning in the classroom

What were the lessons learned?

- The involvement of school leadership in the implementation of project activities at the school level is important in achieving



he objectives of a project. This is significant in giving direction to the project in schools, but also rallying school resources including human resources for the implementation of the project.

- For the child rights advocacy, the involvement of PTA/SMC and Assembly members in the activities of Young Reporters provided the appropriate support for the advocacy work on child rights at the community level.

Mobile for Social Inclusive Governance (MSIG)

In 2016, Savana Signatures with financial support from Making All Voices Count (MAVC) continued to implement Mobile for Social Inclusive Governance (MSIG) project.

MSIG targeted women, youth, marginalized and People Living With Disabilities (PLWDs) groups in the project area.

MSIG sought to connect citizens, particularly the marginalized and vulnerable groups to policy makers through the use of the mobile phone.

The main objective of the project is to bridge communication gap between local government authorities and their citizens and to create an opportunity for easy interaction between them at a distance. This is also to help deepens dialogue and enhance citizen's participation in local governance.

By December 2016, MSIG has reached out to 302,000 people with the message of accountability, responsibilities and local governance processes and systems. This has encouraged the targeted beneficiaries to participate in local governance process thereby increasing the demand for government services, and accountability.

What is MSIG?

MSIG project sought to empower district assemblies and civil society organizations (CSOs) to build a panel of thousands of diverse constituents and “thought leaders” from the beneficiary districts to speak up and track assemblies' deliveries.

What is CIP?

CIP is a mobile communication platform that allows the assemblies and citizens to interreact and exchange information on government services in real-time.

In the year under review, DAs used CIP to reach out to their citizens (women, youth, marginalized and PWD groups) with information about on-going development projects, social issues and also sought views and opinions from the citizens regarding the quality of government services being provided through mobile survey.

How to use CIP

Each beneficiary DA was allocated a dedicated phone line/number. The CIP served as a complain platform for citizens and was used to demand for improved government services or actions.

Education is said to be the cornerstone of socio-economic and human resource development of every nation. But across the world, many schools faced the problem of low quality of education which is more prevalent in developing countries such as Ghana.

The problem of low quality of education is often caused by poor teaching and learning methodologies, lack of trained teachers, unavailability of teaching and learning materials and to some extent, poor educational infrastructure as stated in Ghana education report 2007.

To improve the quality of education a lot more needs to be done which includes the use of ICTs, developing new teaching and learning methodologies, provision of quality school infrastructure and training more teachers.

Based on this, Savana Signatures in partnership with Edukans in 2016 organized an educational improvement event known as Going Global.



The Going Global programme is an educational, cultural and social exchange programme that exposes Dutch students to deprivation in schools in developing nations.

The going global programme was organized based on three building blocks: rising awareness, exchange and action.
